Aron Kodesh Materials

textiles:

tapestries, curtains, and tent hand-woven of linen, cotton and rayon

wood:

cedar, mahogany, ebony, douglas fir


metal:

bronze, copper

line and canvas: ultra-low stretch sailboat racing line, such as Vectran V100 Sunbrella, awning grade

wood finish: beeswax & flax seed oil

dimensions: 11' (L) x 5'6" (W) x 9' (H), rising to 12' at the peak



The entire structure is put together without metal fasteners, using interlocking joints and dowels, with the exception of the floorboards which are attached with bronze screws so that if needed the boards can be removed. All materials are of the highest quality, as befits a sacred object, such as kiln-dried vertical grain cedar, true mahogany from Honduras, and ebony from Gabon in Africa. Each piece of wood was hand selected for grain and appearance.

The textiles were hand-woven on an electronically controlled Jacquard loom, using yarns of Swedish linen, Italian cotton and American rayon. The textiles were realized using computer-aided software for Jacquard weaving.

To complement the Aron Kodesh, we look forward to a new Torah cabinet (David Finn, design concept) and bimah ensemble (Cathy Bolding, textiles).

The interior imagery of the ark itself is meant to contain echoes of another world and time, based on descriptions in Exodus. As you approach the ark, you see, and hopefully feel, more and more of a spiritual realm within the tent than was glimpsed from the sanctuary seats. The cherubim that guarded the Holy of Holies are suggested in the winged curtains that will open to reveal a distant horizon seen through the edge of a palm grove, making the depth of the interior seem unbounded. For within there is another sky, a deeper more meditative blue, shading to violet. ...Our congregation's services sometimes have a hypnotic effect on me. And in this state the Torah's world of trials, wandering and uplift becomes profoundly real to me. and from the very first time, the rich description of the Mishkan [Tabernacle] was very compelling. I felt that it expressed our congregation, but not only for our lack of a permanent home at the time. Our congregation has a directness in worship and ritual. rooted in participatory practice. The simplicity and immediacy of the Mishkan, and the notion that everyone contributed what they could to its making, suits us far better than the imposing magnificence of the Temple in Jerusalem, and so it is our inspiration.
