hose of us who were privileged (fortunate? destined?) to sit around that now infamous kitchen table ten years ago, could never have dreamed that in this short expanse of time and space, we would be a growing, thriving full-service congregation

with more than three hundred and eighty households. Sure, many of us 'old-timers' have memories about those first few months (and, being fully human, we all remember things slightly differently).

One of my first memories is that of wanting us to be

a minyan - not a shul, but a place in which women could participate equally in a traditional, Conservative setting. Who would have guessed that just a few months after that 'kitchen-table' meeting, we would transform from a minyan into a shul. And then there were the firsts: the first babynaming; the first bar mitzvah, the first bat mitzvah, the first funeral, the first wedding, the first adult binai mitzvah - actually, I remember saying almost every week: 'this is the first...' because in the life of our shul, there were lots of firsts. Some of these 'firsts' were not only life cycle markers, but personal events and achievements. People grew and learned how to read Torah, Haftorah, how to daven, how to be a gabbai, how to read a Megillah. We studied, we organized, we started collecting dues(!), we formed a *chevra kadisha*, we started a school, we joined Midrasha, etc., etc. All those beginnings were full of surprises and thrills. We clearly had found our niche in the greater Berkeley Jewish marketplace.

RABBI'S COLUMN

ABOUT SHORT REFLECTION ON TEN YEARS

So now we're in our adolescence, as it were. The enthusiasm and energy levels are, at this point, simply different than those of earlier years. Three hundred and eighty households is vastly different from forty or fifty or even one hundred and fifty. Even the nature of volunteerism has changed and must change (remember the mishloach manot project - which in the early days could be done by a few volunteers, but now needs an entire army of volunteers to bake, pack and deliver the hamentaschen?)

Can we ever return to those 'olden days of yore'? Should we return to those olden days? When I thought about this question,

particularly in light of ten years of growth, I was able to learn something from our tradition. Actually, from the prayer we say when we return the Torah to the ark (that prayer from which our congregation's name was taken). It is the last line in 'etz

chayim he'and actually is a verse from the book of Lamentations: Hashiveinu Adonai aylecha vinashuva, chadesh yameynu kikedem.' - Return us, Adonai, to You and we shall return, renew our days as of old.' But history cannot repeat itself exactly as it was. Nothing in life can. So what does this verse

mean? For me it means that we are asking for God's help - to make it possible not to relive an experience, or even to return us to those days, but to enable us to regain the life and delight and enthusiasm and motivation and spirit of that initial encounter or event. It is this 'renewal" that we seek - the joy that we experienced in creating those 'firsts' - not the 'firsts' themselves. That, essentially, is where we are this June as we celebrate our 10th anniversary. It is our prayer to God (and our reminder to ourselves) that we, together, have the possibility of growing creatively into adulthood with the same vigor with which we started, so that we may be a blessing to all and that we can truly build a place in which God can reside.



advisor, and a man full of passion and belief in Netivot Shalom. The day after he died, many of us sat through Shabbat services. It was a morning of heavy sighs and heavy hearts. As a community we allowed the sadness to embrace us collectively, and I must say it felt good to be there. In the days that followed I found myself in awe of the outpouring of care from Netivot Shalom, towards Helen (his wife) and their children. I felt very proud to be a part of such a community.

As time passes and we feel a bit more healed, lets not forget the spirit of community and closeness that held us together through this loss. As for Sandy, his memory will settle within the hearts of each of us who knew him and within our collective heart as well.

Secondly, I wanted to tell everyone about a new program that was developed by Iris Greenbaum, called Shabbat B'Yachad. This is a Shabbat service for children five and under and their parents. Sounds simple enough, wouldn't you say? But it is not simple at all, it's magical.

Imagine twenty small children standing under several large tallitot held high by their parents. The sun streaming in from the window casts shades of blue and white on the children. Everyone is smiling and dancing around and singing. Or picture twenty marching kids in a Torah procession, each clutching a soft stuffed Torah, singing "Toooorah, Tooorah, Tooorah..." It is one of the sweetest sights I have ever seen.

Every second Shabbat at 11:00 am you can visit Shabbat B'Yachad. If you have a child five or under, please do yourself and your child a favor and try it. If you do not have a child/children either that age or at all, stop by and visit this wonderful program anyhow. It will make you wish you were a child.

B'Shalom Pauline Moreno n the Shabbat of June 5th we read *Parashat Beha'alotecha*. The text recounts the observance of Passover as commanded by God: "Let the Israelite people offer the Passover sacrifice at its set time.... in accordance with all its rules and rites". The Torah tells us that the Israelites offered the Passover sacrifice as instructed.

However, there were some people in the camp who were ritually impure, and thus could not offer the Passover sacrifice on that day. Appearing before Moses and Aaron they asked, "...... Why must we be barred from presenting the Lord's offering at its set time with the rest of the Israelites?" Moses did not know the answer to their question, so he instruct-

ed them to wait while he consulted God. This teaches that a judge should not be ashamed to say, "That is a law with which I am unfamiliar. Wait and I will ask a higher authority or one with more knowledge."

This lesson is an important one for teachers and parents. One should not be embarrassed if he or she does not know something. By saying that you are not sure, and that you need to consult a book, or a more knowledgeable person, you are modeling a healthy learning process for your children. If children see you, an adult, feel comfortable looking for information, they will be less hesitant to admit ignorance, or ask for help.

In addition to classroom study, we are proud to have been able to offer tutoring to children whose learning styles make learning Hebrew especially challenging.

Judy provided parents with valuable information about Jewish customs and parenting while assistant Nicole Monastersky enthralled children with stories, games, scavenger hunts and art projects. Jenn Schindel has done a spectacular job with our kindergarten class! She accepted the challenge of teaching on Shabbat, and helped our youngest religious school students explore the stories of our Torah, celebrate holidays, and participate in their own service. The highlight of the kindergarten Shabbat morning was the opportunity to come into the main service to kiss the Torah as it went by in the processional. Jenn will be graduating from Berkeley this year, and is exploring options for next year. Thanks, Jenn!

I would like to thank Michael Feinberg, who has been teaching first grade at Netivot Shalom for several years. From introducing our students to the letters of Aleph-Bet, to exploring the weekly Torah portion through stories, games and activities, Mike's boundless enthusiasm has made the grades 1 and 2 'mini minyan' fun. Mike will return

after his summer marriage and honeymoon.

Thanks to Ali Cloth and Revital Heller, our second graders have completed the task of learning to read Hebrew. Both Ali and Revital have really taken the time to get to know each of their students. Congratulations to Ali, who will be at Harvard next year earning

her Masters in school psychology. Revital, a sophomore at UC Berkeley next year, will be returning to teach a very lucky group of second graders. Also, thanks to Sarah Eisenberg our Shabbat assistant and to Diana Wood, our volunteer.

Matt Hoffman completed his sixth year of teaching third grade at Netivot Shalom. He has done a super job with Hebrew. The *Tzedakah* fair was a big hit again this year, with a lot of money raised to help animals in Israel. Matt will spend next year finishing his dissertation while teaching adult classes related to his research. He will also begin searching for a faculty position as a professor of Jewish history. Shalom Matt, we will miss you.

Shimon Bonem gets thanks for not only improving the Hebrew skills of his fourth grade students, deeply engaging them in Torah study, but for providing them with two special programs: On Tu B'shevat, Shimon showed his slides from a conservation trip in the "Cloud Forest" in Ecuador. He brought a Holocaust survivor to speak to our older students on Yom Hashoah. Accepted to a program of study at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, Shimon is in the process of deciding whether or not to go.

Hugh Seid, our fifth and sixth grade teacher, had another splendid year. Hugh created fun opportunities for Hebrew review on Shabbat. He has also done an excellent job facilitating discussions about such complicated matters as prayer, Israel, Kosovo and the Columbine High School shootings. He has also been instrumental in the development of the Torah and *mitzvah* curriculum for the Amitim class. Hugh will be starting at Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in Philadelphia this fall. We will miss him.

This year, we continued to enhance and refine the curriculum of the Amitim program. Amitim learned the skills that they needed in order to lead our congregation in prayer. Our tutors, Pamela Sawyer and Coby Harris-Rudolph provided students with individual attention. Pamela Sawyer will return as Amitim tutor in the fall. Coby Harris-Rudolph, (continued on next page)

who has been tutoring our Amitim for many years, will be graduating high school, and starts a Young Judaea year course in Israel next year. Thank you, and good luck!

In a new program, Amitim students delved deeply into their Torah portions by examining traditional sources and through creative writing, art and drama. Students also studied *mitzvoth*, and did public service projects such as presenting Jewish residents of the Claremont House with a Passover program, helping to clean up the shoreline at a marine Park in Oakland, packing *mishloach manot* for the entire community, and helping the North Berkeley Senior Center put in a new garden. Several synagogue members deserve thanks for enhancing our Amitim program with their volunteer work. Jan Fischer made beautiful cloth *siddur* covers for the class, Lee Feinstein lead a *tallit* making project, and Glenn Massarano taught us the hand signals for *trope*.

After their B'nai Mitzvah, Netivot Shalom youth continue their Jewish education at Midrasha. Netivot Shalom has 53 students enrolled, and next year, we will have up to 60 students, one fifth of the total Midrasha student body! Several of our students study not only on Sunday mornings, but also during the week. The response to the upcoming Midrasha Shabbat was so great, it was difficult to find roles in our service for all who wished to participate!

Everyone should know the contributions our young people make. They work in the religious school as teaching assistants, and help to run the school and synagogue office. Our youth have become excellent teachers, who show maturity, responsibility and willingness to help. Thanks to Rachel, Judith, Gilad, Becky, Zephira, Rebecca Daria, Tali, Gal, and Coby. We could not do it without you!

The special programs have continued to grow. *Yamim Noraim IYeladim*, our High Holiday program for kids, was a success. Over 120 children took part in the events that included educational programming, *tefillot*, a show, a storyteller, and a birthday party for the world. The extra space at Thousand Oaks Baptist Church allowed more children the opportunity to participate.

We are pleased to have added two new youth groups. Our alliance with Young Judaea has led to the creation of the Tzofim for seventh and eighth graders, and the Ofarim, a group for young people in grades 3-6. Youth can now participate in activities such as ice skating, and bowling, and come to club meetings where they explore Jewish topics and plan future events. We welcome your participation in helping get these groups off the ground.

I would like to thank Golda Blum, who has organized and streamlined our system for recruiting school volunteers. Her tireless efforts, and numerous phone calls, mean there is always someone scheduled to set up the religious school on Shabbat and to help with traffic during the week. Many families have fulfilled their volunteering obligations by helping in the office, setting up kid's *kiddush*, or doing special projects. Thanks to you all!

There are currently two new Family Room groups active in our shul. The original group, led by Vicky Kelman, continues to meet periodically for learning and celebration. The second group, led by Debbie Isaak-Shapiro is in its second year and hopes to continue. Debbie is looking forward to gathering a new Family Room group together next year. Our family preschool program has grown as the population of children under the age of five in our synagogue has increased. The Shabbat Magic series for families with children in kindergarten, in its second year, has created a mini community among members. The pajama havdalah was a big hit, with 18 families attending. We also added programming for families with children in grades 1-4. Family programmer, and social work student, Linda Karlin created interactive programs for exploring Jewish values. Due to a generous contribution from Vicky Kelman, Netivot Shalom families enjoyed a series of workshops this spring where area artists shared their expertise and guided families in the creation of beautiful, Jewish art objects.

This year we also began exploring the development of a Ramah Day Camp at Netivot Shalom. This summer program, affiliated with the Ramah camping movement, would combine a high quality day camp with Conservative Jewish education. In order to have a longer session, we have decided to postpone opening until next summer. If you would like more information, speak to Dan Alter or to Rabbi Kelman.

Finally thanks to the members of the youth education committee, and its chairs, Shari Rifas and Alison Cohen, for their dedication and support. Also thanks to Iris Greenbaum, Mindy Blechman, Rochelle Guinasso, Robin Keller, Ruth Paris, Norman Rosenblatt, and Joe Meresman. Thanks to Noga Gressel for serving as a resource to our Amitim families. Thanks to Dinah Beck for a year of tutoring. And, of course, thanks to Rabbi Kelman for your guidance, great ideas, and advice.

Andrea Altschuler and Claire Davidson are our new youth education co-chairs. With the youth education committee in their capable hands, I expect our religious school and family programs to reach new heights. There are already great things in the works, which you will be hearing about soon. Welcome to new committee member, Lauren Helfand.

As many of you know, this is my last year as education director at Netivot Shalom. I will be moving to Philadelphia to join my fiance, Michael Fessler, a rabbinical student at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College. I also plan to begin my own study for the rabbinate. Although I depart for happy reasons, I am sad to be leaving Netivot Shalom, and the Berkeley Jewish community. In my two years here, I have made friends, learned a lot, and become part of this great community. Mike and I hope to visit often. If you are in Philadelphia, please look us up, and spend Shabbat with us. Shalom ulehitraot.






A Jewish Historian Talks about Christianity: What Jews Should Know


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SITE COMMITTEE By Josh Gressel NEEDS YOUR INPUT

SHABBAT REST?

Excerpted from my journal entry dated April 3, 1999

What an odd day. I got to shul early and Ken Schnur greeted me with the awful news that Sandy Schneider had died. My mind went blank. Sandy is younger than dad is. How can he be dead? I didn't know what to say or do. Stu was on the other side of the room. I really wanted to talk to him, but he was busy.

Just then my friend, Leo, came in and invited me to go to Torah study. I don't usually get there in time to go, but since it was early, I went. The conversation went back and forth between the members of class — something about the 13 attributes of God. I couldn't concentrate. In my mind, I kept seeing Sandy's wonderfully colorful ties.

After the study was over I asked Leo to put on my *Tallit* and I got a *Siddur*. I wasn't ready to be in a room full of people. Too much had happened before 10 o'clock in the morning! Since there were no greeters, I parked my chair outside the main doors and halfheartedly tried to follow the prayers that drifted through the open door. People came and went. I stopped anyone who knew Sandy and broke the news. I recognized the shock in their eyes as my own. I asked Jan Fischer for a hug. Her broad chest and strong arms comforted me. I didn't really know Sandy well. But, I felt the community that stood by me during my worse times had lost some of its strength.

The Torah service started. I went inside. I thought about moving chairs so I could sit between the stage and Ken. I didn't want to sit alone. I looked at the back row where there is always a space for my chair. There were strangers sitting next to my spot. I looked again and saw Jan and Don sitting in the row in front. I felt better about taking my usual seat. Before we read *Shir Ha Shirim*, Stu announced Sandy's death. As he began, Jan reached back to squeeze my hand. I moved my chair and sat in the aisle next to Jan. We all needed each other.

There was a strong feeling of loss in the air. It was hard to *davvin*. Pauline barely got through the announcements. She broke into tears and Stu stood up and took her in his arms. Watching them, I felt happy that this was my community!



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
