



any of you know that I usually spend one week teaching a course in liturgy at the University of Judaism during the last week each June. This year was particularly won-

derful, since I was privileged to teach with a colleague, Saul Wachs, who actually was my first High Holiday nusach teacher, about forty years ago. Five days of teaching the Amidah (and only the Amidah) was pretty strenuous, but tremendously rewarding and fulfilling.

In earlier years, I taught other aspects of our liturgy. For the past few, especially when I worked with Debbie Friedman, I came to see the powerful effect that studying and experiencing our rich liturgy could have upon those who joined our classes. One part of our liturgy, in particular, stood out. It is the prayers that concern themselves with refuat haguf and refuat hanefesh - healing of body and healing of soul. Over and over again, when I recite the *Mi Sheberach* on Shabbat morning or when we sing Debbie's melody for Mi Sheberach, I have a feeling that, somehow, the magic of the liturgy brings comfort and healing to those in need. A close friend of mine even told me that he made it through a painful recovery after heart surgery by listening over and over again to Debbie's

> by Rabbi Stuart Kelman music. So, for the last few years, at the University of Judaism and in retreats I've b

nationwide, I (often with Debbie and others) have taken an hour or two and held an experiential program. In the past we've called this by its popular name: A Healing Service. But over time, I've become increasingly uncomfortable with the term 'Service' because it is not a "service" as we typically define one (no amidah, no shema). So, what to call this experience? Often, I use the phrase 'a liturgy of healing'. But this, too, does not do justice to the event. We spend the time studying parts of the traditional liturgy which deal with healing, singing some modern compositions,

studying the story of Miriam and how Moses prayed for her recovery, listening quietly to appropriate readings, and thinking to ourselves about the possible applications these liturgical

> themes have for our own daily lives. Unlike other healing experiences, this one does not require anyone to divulge any personal experiences. Rather, it is the group which goes through a process - togeth-

er, but as individuals.

I've been doing these sessions for about ten years now in different parts of North America. Many people in our congregation have asked me to conduct this "Refuat Hanefesh, Refuat Haguf: An Evening of Liturgy and Healing" experience here. (By the way, that's the tentative name, as of now.) So, I have invited Gail Foorman, currently a UJ rabbinical student, to join me for an upcomingevening of healing. I invite you to come and experience the power of our liturgy to renew and refresh the spirit. This also may serve as a preparation for our upcoming High Holiday season. 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


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FROM ROBERTO NOVOA:

When Miriam Hyman announced in November that she would be leaving Netivot Shalom to attend the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in Philadelphia (and get married), a subcommittee of the education committee was formed to search for an educator. It was with great sadness that we said good-bye to Miriam. Our search for a replacement, however, has not yielded a qualified full-time educator. Truth be told, this year, there were at least 12 full-time positions available here in the Bay Area for educators. Most of those positions have gone unfilled. We have therefore, divided the responsibilities into a few parts. We are extraordinarily fortunate to have people in our own community who were prepared to step in and run our educational enterprise. Wendy Rosov, whom many of you know (and who is famous for her Kiddush announcement technique) will be our Youth Education Coordinator, responsible for all aspects of administration of our school and holidays programming. In addition, Wendy will direct the Amitim program for all our b'nai mitzvah. Masha Savitz, who was previously one of our outstanding teachers, returns as the Religious School Director, responsible for everything that concerns that population. In addition, she will be the person running Yomim Noraim L'Yeladim, our famous High Holyday program for children, and it's newer cousin: Chagim L'Yeladim, a similarly designed program which we will run on the three festivals of Sukkot, Pesach and Shavuot. Assisting in the office and teaching will be Michelle Wolfson. Iris Greenbaum

returns as Program Director, working half-time primarily with adults. Through a matching grant offered by the Civic Foundation, we were able to increase the amount of time she can spend with us in developing programs for specific populations. That is the team for 5760.

### ADULT EDUCATION

Last year, Sanne DeWitt saw a need, and asked the Torah Study participants to help her meet it. People who led the discussion on the weekly *parashah* often shared with Sanne their frustration that they could not check the library's reference books out for home use, and as a result often had difficulty getting access to the materials they needed. With the help of generous donations from the Torah Study regulars, we've been able to purchase second copies of some of the most commonly used reference books (Leibowitz, JPS Torah commentaries, Plaut, Milgrom's Leviticus, Rashi, Mikraot Gedolot). They will be located on a separate shelf in the library and will be available for two week checkout by congregants preparing to lead a Torah Study session or give a *drash. Todah rabbah* to Sanne and all those who donated to the Torah Study fund last year.


### SELICHOT

Please join us for all or part of the evening on Saturday, September 4th, at Northbrae Church (Haver Hall) for study, song and prayer. The program will begin at 9:15 p.m. with *ma'ariv & havdalah* services, followed by a review of the common High Holiday *niggunim* (melodies). After a break for schmoozing and refreshments, two concurrent study sessions will begin at 10:15. The evening will conclude with the traditional *Selichot* service at midnight.

The first study session, led by Esther Brass, is entitled *"L'Shonot Selicha:* Terms of Forgiveness." This will be an exploration of prayers and other verbal ways to atone for wrongs committed between oneself and others, and between people and God.

Esther Brass, Ph.D. is a psychologist and studies and teaches Torah as an avocation.

In second study session, Sheila Jelen and Shachar Pinsker (topic TBA but guaranteed to be seasonal) will lead guided *Chevruta* study. *Chevruta* is a traditional way of learning Torah and Talmud by studying texts (in English translation, if desired) in pairs or very small groups. Leaders pick a topic, choose and prepare texts for study, introduce the topic and propose questions to ask in reading the texts, circulate among the groups to help when the going gets tough, and facilitate a plenary discussion at the end of the class. HERE ARE A FEW THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT HAVING YOUR SIMCHA AT NETIVOT SHALOM:

• It is a synagogue policy to have a child's bar/bat mitzvah as soon after the child's 13th Hebrew birthday as possible.

• In order to have a bar/bat mitzvah at Netivot Shalom a child must have had five years of formal Jewish education and enroll in the Amitim program.

• In order to enroll your child in our Amitim (B'nai Mitzvah) program your family must have been a member of Netivot Shalom for at least one year prior to enrollment.

• Amitim is a year-long commitment. Students are expected to complete the program even if their bar/bat mitzvah falls during the amitim year.

• Amitim grads are expected to continue their education at Midrasha throughout high school.

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
