

YOMIM NORAIM NOTES FROM THE RITUAL COMMITTEE

5760 is fast approaching and the ritual committee has been struggling to find ways to seat the growing numbers of members and guests for our Yamim Noraim services. We have arrived at a solution that we think will provide a spiritual experience for all without making anyone feel like second-class citizens. Our solution involves holding services once again at the Northbrae campus BUT running more concurrent, full services. We also eliminated color-coded tickets. This year, everyone will have the chance to sit in any of the locations in which services are being held. We anticipate that people may wish to choose their seats based on davener, not location. A separate announcement on the *davener* line-up is being prepared. Since seating is on a first come first serve basis, if you do have a particular service you want to attend, please come early. One of the harder decisions the committee had to make this year concerned the end of Yom Kippur. To accommodate our larger community, we will need to use Haver Hall for a second Neilah. This means that we will not have a space for a conventional break-thefast. We are still working on some "lite" break-the-fast ideas. Please understand that none of these decisions were easy to make. The ritual committee welcomes your ideas and feedback for planning next year's Yamim Noraim. Meanwhile, we look forward to davening together on the holy days and throughout the year. Jerry

SPECIAL EVENTS FOR THE NEW YEAR

Selichot

Please join us for all or part of the evening on Saturday, September 4, at Northbrae Church (Haver Hall) for study, song and prayer. The program will begin at 9:15 pm with *ma'ariv & havdalah* services led by Cantor Fischer, followed by a review of the common High Holiday *niggunim*. After a break for schmoozing and refreshments, two concurrent study sessions will begin at 10:15. The evening will conclude with the traditional *Selichot* service at midnight led by Rabbi Kelman and Cantor Don Fischer.

The first study session, led by Esther Brass, is entitled "LShonot Selicha: Terms of Forgiveness." This session will include study of selichot liturgy and discussion of different facets of selicha, forgiveness: Torah sources in liturgy of Yamim Noraim (Days of Awe). How do the liturgical and biblical texts illuminate issues of selicha? Learning and singing a Sephardic piyut (liturgical prayer) Discussing selicha for wrongs bayn adam lamakom, between a person and G-d, and bayn adam lihavairo, between one person and another.

Esther Brass, Ph.D. is a psychologist and studies and teaches Torah as an avocation.

In second study session, Sheila Jelen and Shachar Pinsker (topic TBA but guaranteed to be seasonal) will lead guided *hevruta* study. *Hevruta* is a traditional way of learning Torah and Talmud by studying texts (in English translation, if desired) in pairs or very small groups. Leaders pick a topic, choose and prepare texts for study, introduce the topic and propose questions to ask in reading the texts, circulate among the groups to help when the going gets tough, and facilitate a plenary discussion at the end of the class. No special background or language skills are required.

Sheila Jelen and Shachar Pinsker are graduate students in modern Hebrew literature at UC Berkeley, have taught biblical and rabbinic texts in the community, and are active members of the GTU's Chevruta Project of the East Bay.

MAIMONIDES GUIDE FOR THE PERPLEXED



hat do Midrasha directors do during the summer? Well, part of the answer is obvious: hire teachers, get registration materials in the mail, write college recommendations, prepare board and teacher handbooks, begin work on our fundraising appeal and silent auction, and clear off all the paperwork that had been clogging the office. However, it was the other part of the summer that emphasized to me what a wonderful community Midrasha is. I spent the best part of the summer at simchas...weddings and engagement parties....of Midrasha former faculty and students. And at each simcha I would run into other members of the Midrasha family and remember that the reason I love this job so much is the people. It is very heartening to sit around with former members of the Midrasha community: students, faculty and parents, and to rediscover what wonderful, wonderful people they are and how much positive influence Midrasha has had on their lives and conversely, they have had on mine. We are indeed a family.

Midrasha is set to begin, although the Jewish calendar has prescribed a strange beginning. Our first day is September 19, followed by two weeks of no school because of Succot and Simhat Torah. We then resume classes on October 10. Most of our faculty is returning. Three are Midrasha alumni, two new teachers have transferred from other Midrashot and only two are totally new to the system. There will be an orientation, primarily for new students and their parents on Wednesday, September 8 at 7.30 in the Beth El sanctuary. Anyone who completes their registration materials by that date will get a \$15 break on their tuition. We are trying to eliminate long lines on the first day of school and are willing to pay you to be cooperative! Last year was amazing in every way: numbers of students, strength of the faculty and smoothness of operations. Here's looking forward to another great year.

TO SUKKOT AND BEYOND notes from Rabbi Kelman

It's time to consider the building of a sukkah. Expert advice is available as are sukkah kits. (Call Jerry or John at Afikomen for more information.)

LULAV and ETROG

Etz peri hadar - the fruit of the beautiful tree - that's how the etrog is described in classical literature. So great is the love that Jews have for this *chag*, that only the choicest of *etrogim* were selected for ritual use. The use of one's own *lulav* and etrog during Sukkot was a primary expression of celebrating the joy of the holyday. So, you can still order a set from Afikomen (our local dealer, until September 7. Price is the same as last year: \$44. For those of you who can not afford to purchase a set, we will have a few sets available at services (though not on Shabbat) and at the shul offices. Come by and 'bentshe lulav' - we'll provide the words and instructions! Chag sameach.

TALMUD RESUMES - every Tuesday evening beginning August 31. 7:30-9 (Sept. 7, 14,21, 28) These weekly sessions are for both beginners and more advanced people. A decoding ability in Hebrew is all that's needed. Come see and learn the genius of the classical rabbis - and how their teachings can be applied to our lives. We are currently studying the tractate *Berachot* (blessings) - essentially, addressing the question of how to be religious in a secular world (sound familiar?). We'll be looking at the Babylonian Talmud (first in English, then in Hebrew) and then comparing that text to the Jerusalem Talmud. Come join or just drop in.

ZEMIROT



Call Claudia 510.558.9200 All donations tax deductible ometimes it is good to review the situation of the Jews of Cuba, especially when it can be done in the voices of those living the experience. To that end, I am including a letter from Isaac Gelen, President of the Maimonides Lodge of B'nai B'rith in Havana to the editor of B'nai B'rith Today. I am also excerpting a letter from the president of the small struggling community of Santa Clara.

FROM ISAAC GELEN, PRESIDENT LOGIA B'NAI B'RITH MAIMÓNIDES June 9, 1999 Dear Brother Dan:

I read with much interest your article which appeared in the January/February issue of *BNAI BRITH TODAY*... Still, I feel the lines which refer briefly to the religious situation of Cuban Jewry in Cuba may be somewhat misleading, and I want to explain why — according to my views, which are those of a person not so deeply observant but who has been respected all his life as a Cuban citizen of Jewish descent.

Certainly, there was a general increase in religious practice of all denominations (Catholic, Protestant, Afro-Cuban, Jewish...) in Cuba since the publication in 1985 of the book Fidel and Religion (a very long interview with a Catholic priest from Brazil), and especially after 1991 when strict adherence to Marxist philosophical principles was dropped as a requirement for belonging to the Cuban Communist Party. But churches or synagogues were never closed by the government. As Jews, we were able to follow our tradition subject only to the limitations of the general economic situation of the country. Curiously enough, we even enjoyed sort of an unexpected privilege when, as a consequence of the downfall of the Soviet block compounded with a harsher US embargo, the kosher meat rations allocated to the Jewish community were kept untouched while the rest of the population had them reduced, a situation which exists to this day. On the other hand, in spite of the impossibility for our 1,500 strong Jewish community remaining in Cuba of buying any goods abroad for lack of hard currency, Passover celebrations, albeit in a modest way, never stopped, thanks, mainly, to a mitzvah of the Jewish Canadian Congress, who have provided the traditional products required every year since 1960.

I recall Castro, himself, complaining in a TV speech about having been taught that "Jews were the killers of Jesus" at the Catholic school where he did his high school. That was in preparation for the visit of the Pope to Cuba. Not long ago he accepted an invitation from the Head of our Community in Vedado, which he visited during last Chanukah, and very friendly addressed some 300 people who were present. It was the first time that a President of this country paid a visit to Cuba's Jewish Community...

other products so kindly sent us, and above all to keep the unity among us in order to be a "family."

The holiday of Purim was very pretty with all the communities of the center of the country. The Seder of Pesaj was beautiful and was carried out with great love. The products for the Seder arrived on time; we count with the good will of Adath Israel Congregation of Havana who always send them to us. We rented a place and invited the community of Caibarien as well as two *madrichim* of the Patronato.

Thank you for sending the Hebrew-Spanish dictionary as well as Ana Frank's Diary, pictures, and letters that are a testimony of the friendship that was born among us and will never end.



Being the Messengers G-d Sends to Comfort the Hurting*

s I fairly often find myself in the Alta Bates neighborhood, I've wondered what it might be like to visit someone. There must always be people who would welcome this, but how does one go about it? I shouldn't just walk into a stranger's room, should I? What's the mechanism?

I brought these questions to Rabbi Kelman recently, and...ta da! I am now the Bikkur Cholim coordinator, following in the fine footsteps of Allison Jordan. Here's what it means:

- 1. The synagogue receives a phone call about a person who is ill.
- 2. Rabbi Kelman assesses the situation, and if appropriate, passes the information on to me.
- 3. I figure out how best to meet the needs of the person or family involved, and either arrange to visit or contact the *merakez* (organizer) of the relevant *shchuna* (neighborhood, divided by zip code).

I am excited to do this, on a purely personal level, since it is a mitzva in which Ii have always been interested. Are you interested too? If there is a demand, we will organize some training on how one goes about it. Our tradition has much to say in this area. There is a booklet and diskettes available from the shul on the topic as well (Give Me Your Hand). Let us merit the doing of mitzvot together,
