ear Rabbi Kelman,

David and I would like to thank you for inviting us to celebrate our aufruf at Netivot Shalom. It is often not until one is gone that the realization of what is missed sets in. We are now in Australia and have begun to research the facets of the Jewish community here. Although there are many, the commu-

nity is spread out in several different suburbs. There is a large Lubavich community here of fairly recent immigrants. In addition there are two large Orthodox k-12 schools. There are two types of synagogues here, Orthodox and "Liberal" (what we would call Reform). We attend the oldest synagogue in Sydney called the Great

Synagogue which is currently a three block walk from our apartment. Beth Yisrael (it's Hebrew name) built in 1878 is a beautiful synagogue. It was restored in the early nineties and is a statement of grandeur and elegance. In spite of the aesthetic beauty and greatness of age, Shabbat is not the same here for me. I sit high in the balcony staring down at the ceremony below. I listen as the choir sings tunes unfamiliar, and when I do sing, I hear only the choir's unified voice resounding in the echoing pockets of the star studded ceiling. It is a beautiful synagogue, with grand formality and amazing accouterments ... but it is not my synagogue. This is where the point made early on in this note, the realization of what is missed, set in. It became abundantly clear to me that I missed the inclusive design of Netivot Shalom. The size or grandeur of the synagogue does not matter, it is the heart which one feels with, not the eyes. My heart is moved by the beauty of an entire congregation in song. My heart is moved when I can reach out to the torah scroll and touch my siddur to my lips. My tears flow as we stand together in jubilant prayer as the ark is closed. My heart is warmed as my friends stand at the bima in an aliya. For each heart it is different, but for my heart, it is these various components that are the makings of the Jewish community I long for.

My warmest thanks to you and everyone at Netivot Shalom who make it the shechinafilled place of worship that it is.

Happy Channukah and Shabbat Shalom.



Amitim: B'nai Mitzvah, 2000


