what point do we, as traditional Conservative Jews, change and accept Sephardic tradition? After all, the argument goes, the Law Committee of the Rabbinical Assembly in Israel has issued a teshuvah (not binding but) permitting the eating and use of these grains in the State of Israel. The quandary: Does the ruling of the RA in Israel hold for us here in the U.S.? The reasons the RA in Israel gave for permitting those items to be used centered around the very nature of the prohibition at the time when it was first introduced; namely, that it was of questionable origin. Further, they argue, in the modern state of Israel, where a significant percentage of the population is Sephardic, obeying the extended prohibition would only tend to prevent Ashkenazim from eating in the homes of their Sephardic neighbors. So, the argument goes, in the State of Israel it is permitted to ignore the "additional" Ashkenazic restrictions. But what about us in

North America? Clearly, our culture does not have the same mix of Ashkenazim and Sephardim which was used as a very major reason for the Israeli ruling. So we are left with the original doubtful origin of this custom. What to do? Many of us would like to do away with this restriction,



based on our study of the origins of this practice. Yet, it seems to me that the strength of this practice in North America out-

weighs its abandonment. In observant households, rice, legumes, corn and millet are not to be found. Here, at least, is one example of holding onto a tradition because of the strength of its common practice, rather than abandoning it for the sake of purist of original motives and intentions.

Now, on to preparing for Pesach. Four steps:

1. The Search for Leaven (chametz): Done on the night before Pesach, to make sure (symbolically) that no chametz remains. We use a candle and a feather to scoop up some chametz that we have intentionally planted in the house. (Obviously, this is done AFTER the house has been cleaned!) Come to our Pot Party to kasher utensils and dishes!

2. The Nullification of Leaven *(chametz)*: After the search, a paragraph found in most Haggadot is

# BUILDING COMMITTEE UPDATE By Pauline Moreno

t the Annual Membership Meeting in February, Art Braufman illustrated the need for us to step up our efforts, and develop a more aggressive plan if we are going to succeed in purchasing our own building. At the February 27 Board meeting, Mike Irwin, Building Committee Chairperson, presented a proposal on hiring a Marketing/Fund Raising organization/consultant to assist us in strategizing, planning, and training for the next step in our building campaign.

The Board of Directors approved the Building Committee's proposal, with a 13-1-1 vote, and authorized the following:

- The Building Committee will immediately begin to interview qualified candidates/companies with experience in designing fund raising/marketing campaigns for non-profit organizations of our size and type.
- The selected candidate will develop a program which:
- Clearly delineates the compelling case for a new building.
- Presents the case to congregants
- Encourages broad discussion by the congregation and tries to build up a consensus on how we should proceed.
- Concludes with a congregational meeting to vote on whether or not we should proceed with a full building fund campaign.
- Expenditure of \$15,000 (maximum) from the Building Fund for this effort

This is a very exciting moment in the life of our congregation and I congratulate the Building Committee and the Board for taking this step. This next phase will need the full involvement of our members to succeed. Our love for this community and vision for the future are the forces that will drive us forward.

(continued on page 4) recited in which we say: if we didn't see it, it (chametz) doesn't exist.

3. Selling of Leaven *(chametz)*: Since *chametz* is not to be in our possession, we sell it usually to the rabbi, who in turn sells it to a non-Jew. There is a special form used for this purpose (see below).

4. Burning of Leaven *(chametz)*: The following morning, the scraps that we have collected are either burned or given to the birds.

Two other suggestions: Check out the Haggadah called: *A Different Night* (and accompanying Leader's Guide). It is, in my humble

opinion, the best text to use in preparation for your seder. It has clear instructions and lots of commentaries and can be used by first-timers as well as those who may be very familiar with the seder. A second suggestion: Prepare yourself as well as your house. While I have described the steps necessary to dispose of all the physical *chametz* in your possession, think about the spiritual *chametz* that you/we own. Spring is a nice time to rid ourselves of this part of our souls, and not to wait till next Rosh Hashanah!

I wish all of you, a *Chag sameach ve'kasher* (or *Chag kasher vesameach*): a joyous and kosher holiday).

# SELLING OF LEAVEN (CHAMETZ)

s ince we are forbidden from possessing *chametz* during Pesach, we sell it to a non-Jew in a transfer ceremony called *Mechirat Chametz* (selling of *chametz*). The rabbi collects all these authorizations and transfers them to a non-Jew who then sells them back once Pesach is over. Wait about an hour after Pesach to use your *chametz*. This form can be mailed back or simply signed and left in our office no later than Wednesday morning, April 19 at 8 am (after minyan). Often, Jews feel that *tzedakah* is an appropriate way to add to the significance of the performance of this mitzvah.

# APPOINTMENT OF AGENT FOR THE SALE OF CHAMETZ

I, the undersigned, fully empower and permit Rabbi Stuart Kelman to act on my behalf to sell all *chametz* possessed by me - knowingly or unknowingly - as defined by Torah and rabbinic law, and to lease all places where *chametz* owned may be found. This transaction will be in effect for the duration of Pesach, which this year begins with sundown of April 19, 200 and runs through April 27, 2000.

# SOCIAL ACTION

Activities Sponsored or Co-Sponsored by the Social Action Committee & Upcoming Activities

**HOLIDAY PACKAGES:** We worked with CNS Etzleinu groups to collect Christmas gifts donated by our congregants for needy families in the East Bay.

**TU B'SHEVAT SHORELINE CLEANUP:** Our January shoreline clean-up was rained out, but will be rescheduled for the Spring/Summer.

OUR SHABBAT GUESTS: On the Shabbat morning of February 19, we welcomed about 15 recent emigres from the former Soviet Union to our services. The East Bay Jewish Family and Children's Services not only gave us the list of people to contact but also phoned each invitee to make sure they understood our invitation and felt welcome (thank you Irina Dugina). When our guests arrived, Claudia Valas led them in a discussion about Judaism, our shul, and the services (of course this discussion would not have been even thinkable without the nimble tongues of our translators, Leonid Plotkin and Miron Goldgiel). Our guests then joined the main Torah service and were able to follow both the service and the Parashat in Russian (thank you Ruth Durling and Alex Madonik). After the service they noshed at the kiddish (special thanks to Jonathan Wexler) and then spent some time discussing Torah with Rabbi Kelman. My favorite question was 'If there's only one Torah, how come there are so many different groups of Jews that disagree with each other?"All in all it was a meaningful event for me personally; but for a twist of fate I could easily be the stranger in this strange land. I hope to see our guests again soon, and I am thinking of other ways to reach out to their community. If you have any ideas, please let me know.

**IN MARCH:** We helped the CNS Rosh Chodesh group with a collection drive for the Women's Daytime Drop-In Clinic in Berkeley. This nonprofit organization addresses the needs of homeless women and children to ensure that they have a safe daytime refuge where they receive support, nourishing meals, and access to community resources to overcome homelessness and regain self-sufficiency.

**SUKKOT IN APRIL:** On April 30th, under the leadership of our captain, Eric Strimling, Netivot Shalom will be helping to fix up the home of an elderly or disabled person in financial need. We will be co-sponsoring the site with other local synagogues, and we need your financial support to make this work. Many thanks to those of you who are donating your time, money and energy to this project.

**EXTENDING KASHRUT:** Through Adult Education, we will develop a class that addresses the ethical issues that we face as consumers. Issues include purchasing goods made by slave/prison/child labor, the actions of companies during the Holocaust, eco-friendly (and unfriendly) corporations and more. This will be combined with a study of Jewish thought on the role of ethics in business.

# The Social Action Committee engages in Tikkun Olam specifically reaching out beyond our immediate members.

We have focused on the following areas:

- 1. Our Neighbors in the East Bay: Netivot Shalom is one kehilla within a larger community, and any problems within the East Bay are also our problems.
- 2. Jews Worldwide: United by our common faith and heritage, we seek to bring material assistance and yiddishkite to our brothers and sisters around the world.
- ${\bf 3}.$  Environment: We promote actions that flow from the recognition that ALL is Holy.
- 4. Education: We teach the value of Tikun Olam through study and action.
- 5. Moral Issues: We participate in the discussion of major moral issues of our time such as the death penalty, human rights and discrimination.

# CUBA CONNECTION By June & Bob Safran

fforts are going at full tilt to take the American Jewish Ballet Company to Havana for the Holocaust program at the end of May in commemoration of the visit of the SS St. Louis in 1939. The company will also teach their curriculum of Torah through dance both to children and adult groups. At the time of writing, we were still \$8,000 short of our goal. With a little help from a lot of our friends, we will make this dream a reality. Instead of talking about it at length, I hope to make my point regarding the value of our efforts to develop the Jewish communities by quoting Reform Rabbi Michael Robinson (Santa Rosa, CA) describing his visit to Havana and Santa Clara in February. In an excerpt from his journal, he speaks about his Kabbalat Shabbat experience in Santa Clara:

"We greet each other as brothers and sisters—hand shakes, hugs and kisses. We wait for all of our group to gather, and David Tacher, the president of the congregation, leads the service. His son Alberto, who taught himself Hebrew, chants a few lines. The prayerbook published in Mexico City is in Spanish and Hebrew. Lo and behold there is a prayer by Henry Cohen ("Imagine a world without color...") from Gates of Prayer. When I tell them (after) that the author is present, they are thrilled. David has Henry autograph the page in his prayerbook. The singing in the service is with gusto. Many melodies Sephardic, some Conservative liturgy. Ruth leads the singing of Kiddush. David comments he never

he new Congregation Netivot Shalom website will provide an interactive format for the discussion of issues that I had previously thought to air in the newsletter. I want to thank Ben Heschen and Ellen Peskin for their hard work and good humor during the evolution of the site. I would also like to solicit ideas from the community at large concerning the content and format of the Adult Education section of the site. Please contact me at jheinstein@hotmail.com.

I was able to attend a session of Rabbi Kelman's class on *Keva* and *Kavannah*, fixed prayer and internal focus. The Rabbi provided a number of sources and perspectives for each of these stations of prayer. Of particular interest to me was the divergence of rabbinic opinion as to the nature of *Keva* in the *Amidah* expressed in a passage from *B Brachot 29b*. The Mishnaic concept of *'t'filato sh'gura b'feev'*, fluency through mastery of prayer, is not mentioned in their attempt to explicate *Keva*. The attributes specified are negative: prayer that resembles a burden, the absence of spontaneous supplication, lack of invention and a separation from nature. This from students of the gentlemen who codified the *Amidah*. If you haven't had a chance to avail yourself of the walking Kelman library on our liturgy...check it out. Tapes are available



heard a woman lead anything in the service before. The congregation is mostly of Turkish descent--three to four generations in Cuba. At end of service they serve a wonderful pasta dish David had prepared along with cake with gooey icing. It was a first for them-first time a group had come and worshipped with them. Virginia was thrilled to have two rabbis in her house--our visit was "a benedicion de la cielo" a blessing from heaven. We leave as we arrived with hugs and kisses. It is a miracle that this tiny community clings to Judaism. Their synagogue is now a restaurant, but it is in their souls that the eternal light burns."

There is much more to tell so stay tuned next month for an update on our friends in both Cuba and Israel. Meanwhile, encourage your friends to help us send the American Jewish Ballet Company to Havana in May. And, if you are free, come with us.

# A PEEK INTO THE WEEKDAY RELIGIOUS SCHOOL CLASSROOMS

Kita Bet: A few weeks ago, while doing an outdoor meditation, a few students noticed a sleeping bag and a set of shoes. The discussion that followed inspired a unit on homelessness. Since that time, we have run a blanket drive, interviewed a homeless member of our community, and discussed homelessness extensively. The students have learned that, as Jews, it is our obligation to help other people no matter who they are.

*Kita Gimmel:* Students are learning the history and traditions of the Havdallah service. They are learning to lead the service, and they are each creating their own Havdallah sets, including wine glasses, spice boxes and candies.

*Kita Dalet:* Students wrote an original Purim play which they presented to second and third grades on the Shabbat before Purim. The group is also learning about the different parts of the Torah service.

*Kita Hay/Vav:* Students are focusing on acquiring the necessary skills to lead the Shabbat morning Torah service and have been attending the main service to become more accustomed to that environment.




